

Judge Says Prosecution Can Offer Spent Shells

PATERSON — Superior Court Judge Samuel A. Lerner yesterday denied a defense motion to suppress evidence in the Rubin (Hurricane) Carter-John Artis murder trial.

Carter, 29, of 498 20th Ave., and Artis, 21, of 5 Tyler St., both of Paterson, are scheduled to go on trial next Monday for the murder of three persons. Carter, a one-time ranking middleweight fighter, and Artis, a sparring partner, are charged with the June 17, 1966 shooting of four persons at the Lafayette Grill, 428 E. 18th St., Paterson.

Oliver, bartender and part owner of the tavern; Fred Nauyoks of Cedar Grove. Mrs. Hazel Tanis of Hawthorne died several weeks later. The fourth victim, William Marins of Paterson, recovered.

Raymond A. Brown of Jersey City, defense lawyer, sought to have the court bar the prosecution, represented by Assistant Prosecutor Vincent Hull Jr. from offering into evidence a Spent 32-caliber pistol cartridge casing and a spent 12-gauge shell. The shells were allegedly found by police in the car Carter and Artis were in when stopped by

police shortly after the shooting.

The car answered a description of one seen leaving the tavern.

After Judge Lerner denied Brown's motion to suppress evidence a 96 member special jury panel was chosen. A jury of 14 persons will be chosen, hopeful from this panel, and it will hear the case.

Judge Lerner said the trial is still slated to begin next Monday. However, it is doubted by some because still unresolved is a previous defense motion for bail for the pair and the answering of certain information sought in a bill of particulars filed by Brown.

Also, at 2 p.m. Friday, Judge Lerner is to hear a motion by Brown to dismiss the murder indictments.

Last Friday Brown filed the motion to dismiss the indictments in which it is alleged Carter and Artis were summoned to testify before a Passaic County Grand Jury last June 29 and signed waivers of immunity which they believed they were required to sign and did not understand. They were charged in October and indicted in December by another grand jury.
