

# Carter-Artis Trial Jury Hunt on Today

Judge Sets Saturday Session in Hope  
Of Starting Testimony Monday Morning

PATERSON — Selection of two more jurors for the murder trial of ranking middleweight boxer Rubin (Hurricane) Carter and John Artis, former high school track star, continued today before Superior Court Judge Samuel A. Lerner.

Yesterday, Adrian T. Breure, 50, of 47 Clinton Ave., Clifton,

was accepted as the 12th juror. He was sworn at 5:12 p.m.

Raymond A. Brown, counsel for Carter, 30, of 498 20th Ave., Paterson, sought to have Breure excused by the court for cause after the man said he was the victim of a mugging in Michigan several years ago.

Breure, an accountant for a New York City brokerage firm, said he has a permanent injury to his left leg as a result. He said the incident would not affect his deciding the case.

Judge Lerner overruled the move and Brown who just previously had used his 10th and last peremptory challenge, said he had no other choice but to accept him.

Arnold M. Stein, representing Artis, 22, of 5 Tyler St., Paterson, said he also would accept Breure. Stein, earlier in the afternoon session of the 15th day of jury selection, used another of his peremptory challenges. He has one left.

Assistant Prosecutor Vincent E. Hull Jr., seeking the death penalty for the pair charged with killing three persons in a June 17, 1966 saloon shooting, said Breure was acceptable to the state.

Breure was the first person seated on the jury since Wednesday morning. During yesterday's sessions, 28 persons were interviewed raising the total to 330 persons examined since the start of the trial on April 17.
